What was done this year

> The interviews with the sex workers were completed and transcribed.

Work on the research article is ongoing and will soon be finished.



Preliminary results

- In empirical terms: it can be assumed that there is a general tendency for sex workers to consider the activities they carry out on the streets of the Zona Rosa of Mexico City as "inappropriate" practices according to social and personal norms. A frequent perception seen in the interviews is that sex work (commonly conceived as "prostitution") is undesirable, but necessary to survive. Based on this perception, their presence in the public space is self-conceived as a transgression, something that threatens the morality of Mexican society (which they themselves violate). For the same reasons.

they wish they did not engage in these activities. Although the self-perception of the presence of sex workers in public space leans more towards what they consider negative, it is very noteworthy that this negativity is now much less serious than it was about ten years ago. Then, morality in the society of Mexico City looked upon homosexuality and sex work much more negatively and this influenced a perception of a greater transgression on the part of sex workers. The regulation of sex work by the police has also become laxer than it was ten years ago. This is linked more to achievements in human

- rights, sexual diversities, and qualitative changes in regulations, than to changing mores.
- In methodological terms, individual interviews
 turned out to be an excellent method to access the
 general perception of sex workers. Group work
 would not have been feasible because they value
 anonymity due to the high amount of prejudice
 against sex work. Therefore, the individual interviews
 were an excellent opportunity to achieve a greater
 openness about their perceptions of public space,
 transgression, and regulation.
